

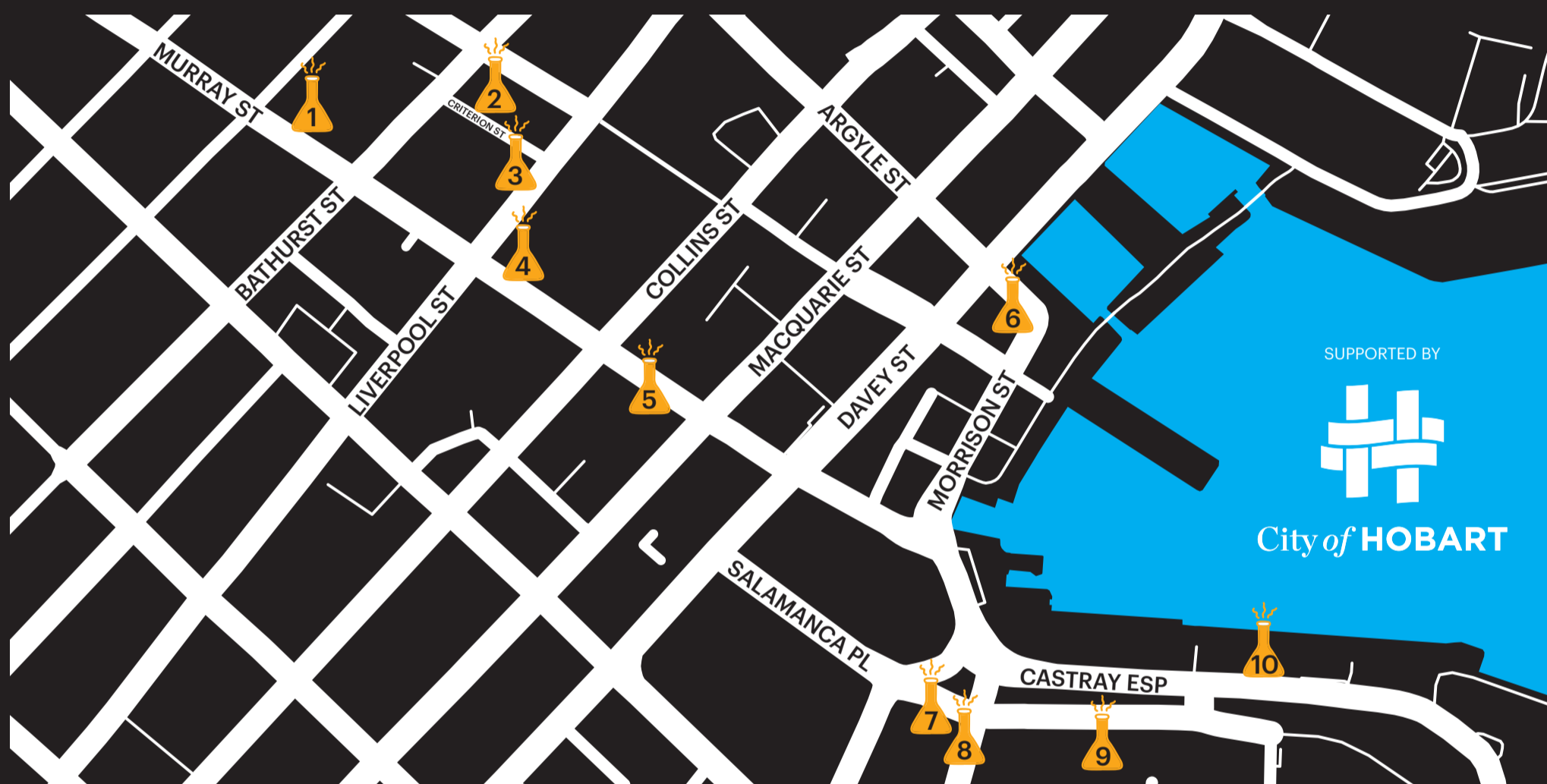

2. New Wines!

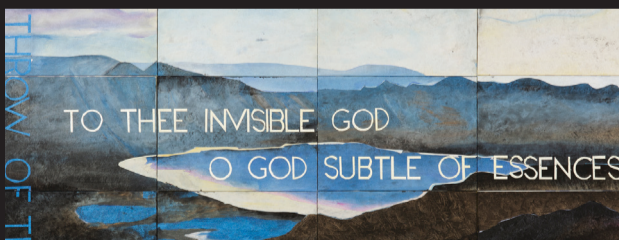

4. Water[shed]

The exhibition Water[shed] marks the 50 years since the flooding of Lake Pedder. 50 artists / 50 years. 5. Colouring Connections: the Wonders of Tree Communication

Talk by scientist Dr Penny Jones at 3pm.



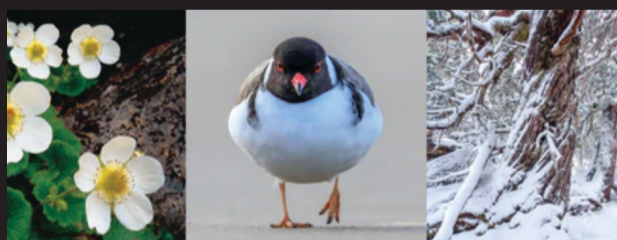
6. The Home of the Blizzard

Come tour the home of Australia's first Antarctic scientists, and have a chat with the first woman to winter over at the historic site. See if you think you have what it takes to live in constant darkness at Cape Denison—the windiest place at sea level on earth!



7. The World of Bees

Find out what the buzz is about bees from a beekeeper and a Beaker Street Roving Scientist. Take home samples of Beauty & The Bees products that are based on Tasmanian Leatherwood honey & beeswax.



8. Threatened Species Project

Tasmania's Threatened Species List comprises 683 species of plants and animals, including insects and other invertebrates. This new exhibition will expand our understanding of the range and diversity of these species and their plight. Come and chat with

the artists and scientists working with Tasmania's most threatened species, surrounded by prints of the local flora and fauna.



9. Some Silken Moment | Jessie French

What is our future made of? In *Some Silken Moment*, Jessie French explores the promise of algae-based bioplastic, creating innovative objects that are elegant, ephemeral, and oceanic. By harnessing this shape-shifting material, French captures a world in a phase of transition, where the permanence of petrochemicals plastics is reimagined through the soft strength of ecological thinking. The exhibit will remain on display until Sunday 4 September.



10. Spotlight on Red Handfish

The critically endangered Red handfish is found only in Tasmania, in two small patches of rocky reef in Fredrick Henry Bay, southeast of Hobart. Scientists estimate there are just 100 individuals left in the wild.

In a new exhibition at IMAS, you'll discover more about this quirky fish and how the Handfish Conservation Project team is working with citizen scientists and others to save it.
